MATTHEW in MARCH!

West Barre United Methodist Church is inviting everyone to read the Gospel of Matthew in this coming season of Lent!

There are 28 chapters in the Gospel according to Matthew. Ash Wednesday will be on February 26, which begins the season of Lent that will lead up to the Easter celebration on April 12.

There is a three-year cycle of scripture readings that are suggested by the Consultation on Common Texts, an ecumenical group of denominations. This three-year cycle is a suggested source of scripture for worship within the United Methodist Church. West Barre UMC's worship is often based on the suggested scripture. The Lectionary readings for each week includes an Old Testament reading, a Psalm, a reading from the Epistles (letters of the New Testament) and each year a Synoptic Gospel (Matthew, Mark, and Luke). This year's Gospel is Matthew.

Because Matthew is the Gospel for this liturgical year, West Barre UMC is choosing to read that Gospel in the season of Lent.

Every Sunday there will be a chart located in the sanctuary for each member of the congregation that has read the chapters of the week to place an anonymous "X" indicating that the chapters have been read.

Every Sunday in Lent the worship will be based on a reading from Matthew.

In addition, Rev. Brad will meet with a group of 5 or more people to delve into the depth of meaning of the week's reading.

If you are interested in such a study, you are invited to gather together a group of 5 or more people and schedule a time with Rev. Brad to hold a weekly or occasional gathering.

These gatherings can be held in a home, a restaurant, or the church building.

- 2/2 Micah 6:1-8 is the scripture for the day, and it tells about the proper offering to God. We will celebrate communion on this day.
- 2/9 Matthew 5:13-16 is the scripture for the day, and it calls us to be salt and light.
- 2/16 Deuteronomy 30:15-20 is the scripture for the day and it is instructions for the people of Israel before they cross into the Promised Land. It warns of wandering from the faith.
- 2/23 This last Sunday in the Epiphany season is a scripture that comes from Matthew 17:1-9, that is about the Transfiguration. Jesus goes up the mountain with a few of his disciples, where he meets with Moses and Elijah. It is a foreshadowing of the resurrection.

The Church Bell Tower is also on the agenda for refurbishing. The parsonage roof has already been repaired as well. The cost of these construction projects is being paid for by the Church's (Home Owner's) Insurance Policy coverage due to wind damage.

At the end of November, the congregation voted to give Jesus the gift of an "Ark" through Heifer International.

At the end of the month of December, God's people had given \$6,700!!! That is an Ark plus \$1,700 toward another one.

The breakdown of money was: Church offering \$4,223; Election Day dinner profit \$2,000; Sunday School \$558; and \$19 from a jar at Harrington's Farm Stand.

Included in those amounts are gifts from another church and from a member out of state.

I was sure we could get one Ark, but of course, God went way beyond my expectations. Someday I will learn not to limit God.



Heifer Internationals mission is to end hunger and poverty while caring for the Earth. They provide livestock and agricultural training to improve families! lives in 20 countries, including the U.S. Families who receive livestock pass along the offspring as their own herds and flocks grow. Over time, a whole community benefits from this gift.

The Missions Committee keeps marching on. We have a mission for every month.

January was Community Action. As of the 26th, we had \$367 to send them and 33 food items have been dropped off.

February's mission is Tina Nguyen. Tina has visited our church and gave a powerful testimony for the Lord and for her work in Vietnam and Cambodia.

Tina is by birth Vietnamese, but grew up in and attended Syracuse University. She was living the "American Dream", job, house, car and was living a good life.

She grew up in a house where her family was Buddhist. In college, she became a Christian through friends. Tina felt that there was something missing in her life and felt led to go to Vietnam to help the people, especially the young girls.

Tina sold everything and went. She felt the call and answered it. She became God's servant. She has touched many lives there, but she also became a target for the government which is ruled by communism.

Tina fled Vietnam and went to Cambodia where there isn't such strict government rule.

She has friends that are starting a church and she has started coffee shops for the girls to work in so they don't need to walk the streets for their living.

Tina is only supported by God's people. She depends on the Lord's favor and is a true missionary, heart and soul.

I hope Tina will come speak at the church either in March or April. Keep your eye on the website. We will make sure it is announced.

Differences, differences....

The last congregation I served before coming to West Barre, was Faith Journey United Methodist Church. If you wanted to attend worship at Faith Journey, there were three different worship services in two different locations. There were three different ways of worshipping within the congregation.

In addition to the three worship services, Faith Journey had helped create a new congregation called "New World Ministries", which consisted of post-refugees from Africa. These folks were from Sudan, South Sudan, Eritrea, and the Congo. They used many different languages, mostly in their singing.

It came to be that Faith Journey also helped create a new United Methodist congregation of post-refugees from Burma (Myanmar). That congregation helped bring a Nepali post-refugee congregation into United Methodism. They in turn brought another Nepali congregation into the United Methodist building, though, as yet, they are not United Methodist.

Each of the worship services would be very different from the other, yet still worshipping the same God. Each group of people had their own longings, wounds, and thus carried a different perspective of God's vision for the world.

I have no idea how many different ways God is worshipped around the world. My hope for the West Barre congregation is the same for every congregation around the world, that the power of the love of God finds its way into every person, no matter who they are.

John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, was open to the many different faiths, and different ways of worshipping God. In one of his often-quoted sermons, he said "If your heart is as my heart, then take my hand".

My hope is that this is always the basis for our ministry together in this community, and communities around the world.
