

The Perfect Gift for Your Young Child

There is no shortage of gift ideas for your young child. Millions of advertising dollars are devoted to directing your attention to the "perfect" gift. You feel guilty if you can't find something that will educate, stimulate, and build self-esteem all at once (and it's got to be politically correct, biodegradable, and bilingual, too). The marketers know that price is no object because this is *your* child, and you won't settle for anything less than the best.

Well, we have a suggestion for the perfect gift. It is not easy to find, and it is terribly expensive, but we guarantee that it will last a lifetime and it will be your child's favorite. We're talking about your time.

Your child's greatest need is the security of knowing that you care. There is no better way to convey your love than to spend time with your child. Hours invested in your child will produce dividends now and in the future. You will be building a relationship, moment by moment, that will be the basis for a lifelong friendship between the two of you.

Don't be misled by the myth of "quality time" – it is an admirable goal, but it should not be used as an excuse for mission "quantity time" with your child. 

Notes from the Past...

From Pine Hill Road;

to establishing "A Garden Radiating Love and Grace" on the other side of the world:

to receiving the highest award
ever conferred upon an American
woman by the Emperor of Japan.....



MILDRED ANNE PAINE

Mildred Anne Paine was born on July 25, 1893 to Martha Vanella Waterman and Emory Corydon Paine. Her family lived in the cobblestone house on Pine Hill.

All of their social life centered in the West Barre Methodist Church. Miss Emma Hill chose books from the Sunday School of adventure and dreams of worlds to win for the students to read.

Mildred started school in the cobblestone school house when she was four years old. There were eight grades in the school. Her parents arranged for Mildred Anne and her older brother to enter a Methodist sponsored high school known as the Genesee Wesleyan Seminary in Lima, NY in 1908. Mildred Anne graduated from the high school in 1913. She taught at the West Barre one room school for two years. She was Grace Peters Allen's first grade teacher. Mildred Anne entered Oberlin College in Oberlin, Ohio. She spent the years of 1915-1916 at Oberlin College.

In the autumn of 1919, Mildred Anne was commissioned by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society as a missionary to Japan. She was sent to Japan in 1920 for one year of language study. Her study was followed by several years of service until 1927 when a furlough allowed her to pursue a Master's degree in Social Work from Boston University. She returned to Japan in 1928 and would stay except for "furlough". In 1943, she was interned by the Japanese.

Mildred Anne was assigned to rebuild an important Methodist sponsored Welfare Center that had been destroyed by an earthquake in 1923. She was responsible for establishing AI KEI GAUKUEN - "A Garden Radiating Love and Grace". It was an orphanage that had schools, a clinic, a camp, and a youth department with over 1100 children and youth enrolled in the various departments. It was established in a poor area for the children of rag pickers.

Rev. Jesse Young and his wife Ruth (in West Barre 1955-1957) picked Mildred Anne up in New York City after her disembarkation from the ship "Gripshoin" – the first ship to leave Japan after World War II. In 1957 – 1958, Pete Nesbitt's squadron cruised the western Pacific. Pête was able to get in contact with Mildred Anne and to visit her.

Mildred Anne received the highest award ever conferred upon an American woman by the Japanese government and was presented this award by the Emperor of Japan.

She returned to West Barre in 1962. Following a stroke, she went to live at the Brooks-Howell Home in Asheville, NC. The home is a retirement facility for deaconesses and women missionaries of the United Methodist Church. She passed away in 1988.
